Kelly Stuible-Clark is a Lansing native who received her Bachelor of Science in Music from Central Michigan University, and her Master of Music in Opera and Musical Theater Performance from Southern Illinois University Carbondale. A specialist in musical theater and commercial voice, Kelly has also worked as an actor, choreographer, and music director for theater. Kelly is certified in Somatic VoiceWork- the LoVietri Method™

Dr. J has been seen throughout the continental United States in Opera, Oratorio, Operetta, Concert, Recital, and

Chamber settings. His “big voice” that “rumbles like foghorns” (Pioneer Press) is regarded as “rich” (Madison Magazine), “heartwarming” (Examiner), and “possessing considerable agility (Grand Rapids Press). He has been a featured performer with the Minnesota Orchestra, Skylark Opera, Fresco Opera Theatre, and Metropolitan Symphony Orchestra. With more than 25 opera roles performed, highlights include “Hamen” in Handel’s Esther, “Father” in Hansel and Gretel, “Scarpia” in Tosca, and “Belcore” in L’elisir d’amore.

Dr. Ten Brink is highly regarded as a performer of early music. A finalist in the debut season of the Handel Aria Competition, he has toured extensively with The Rose Ensemble, given the North American premier as Alfesibeo in Cavalli’s resurrected Gli Amore d’Apollo e di Daphne under the musical direction of Paul O’Dette, and is well known as an interpreter of J.S. Bach, having performed and recorded both Passions, the Christmas Oratorio, Magnificat, and numerous cantatas.

An advocate of contemporary music, Dr. Ten Brink has given first readings of nearly 100 works. He worked with Meredith Monk on the Songs of Ascension premier at the Walker Art Center, and was part of a 24-hour performance of Piotr Szyhalski’s Empty Words project for the Northern Lights Minnesota Festival. He performed in the Dark River Opera premier, gave the professional premier as "Joe Briggmann" in Sweets by Kate, and sang as "Sarastro" in Fresco Opera Theatre's performance of Queen of the Night, a newly composed prequel to Mozart's Magic Flute.

His discography includes a multiple award winning production of Handel’s Messiah with the Calvin College Oratorio Society, J. S. Bach’s Matthäus-Passion and Johannes-Passion, the only English version of Heinz Werner Zimmermann’s Psalmkonzert, Live: Music from the Land of

Three Faiths with The Rose Ensemble, and a Grammy nominated performance of Mozart's Grand Mass with Exultate. He holds degrees from the University of Minnesota (DMA), Bowling Green State University (MM), and Calvin College (BA).

Students of Dr. Ten Brink have gone on to successful careers as recording artists, conductors, music educators, and classical performers. They have been accepted into universities and conservatories across the country.

Dr. J conducts the Concert Choir, in addition to teaching voice, Musical Cultures, and the studio class. He also advises students in the Music Program.

Boris was born in Moscow, Russia in 1972. In 1987-1991 Boris studied at specialized music high school, named Gnessin High School. He learned classical piano under the guidance of Vladimir Bochkarev, who was one of the leading piano teachers in that high school.

In 1991 he entered Moscow State Conservatory and continued to study classical piano under the guidance of Professor Zinaida Ignatieva.

In 1994 he participated in First International Piano Competition "Franz Lizst" in Weimar, Germany, where he was granted an Honorable Mention for being selected for the Second Round of the Competition. In March 1996 Boris participated in Kingsville International Piano Competition in Kingsville, Texas, where he was granted Special Prize for Outstanding Piano Performance.

In 1996 Boris graduated from Moscow Conservatory and moved to the United States. In September 1996 Boris entered New School in New York, NY to pursue his Master of Music degree. He graduated in 1998. The same year he entered University of Southern California

to pursue his Doctor of Musical Arts degree. He majored in Piano Performance and minored in Jazz, History of Music and Electro-Acoustic Media.

In 2003 Boris graduated from USC with Doctor of Musical Arts degree and for 2 years worked at OrchePia School of Music in Irvine as a piano instructor.

In 2005 Boris returned to Russia, where he worked both as a piano instructor with private students and as English language teacher at Denis School of Languages in Moscow.

In 2009 Boris moved to China to work at Zaozhuang University in Zaozhuang, Shandong, China. He worked as a piano teacher and an accompanist at Zaozhuang University and provided accompaniment to various teachers and students at Shandong Teachers and Students Music Competitions in Jinan and other cities as well. Some of them received prizes at these competitions after our joint performances. He also performed two piano recitals at Zaozhuang University Music Concert Hall in 2012 and 2013 and participated in Zaozhuang TV concerts several times. He was fortunate to be able to teach both Russian and English languages during his ten-year work as a teacher at Zaozhuang University.

In July 2019 Boris received his permanent resident status in the United States and moved to the United States again. He currently works at Lansing Community College in Lansing, MI. At the Lansing Community College he teaches various courses including private piano lessons, Musical Cultures class, Keyboard Harmony and he accompanies the concert choir.
